Why did you decide to become a principal?

I decided pretty early in my career that I wanted to get into school administration. I started my teaching career at Ridley High School in Folsom PA and it was probably my second or third year I decided I wanted to get into becoming a school leader, so I started working on that. A few years later I became an assistant principal and I worked my way up from there. I think what enticed me most was that there were aspects of the classroom that I loved, specifically working with young people and teachers. What are some future plans for school? What should we look forward to?

We'll continue finding ways to increase student voice in our school and student representation in our building so that when students look around they see themselves reflect in our programs and in our school.

As a school district we can expect that in the next two to three years we'll be taking a close and serious look at start times. My guess is that within the next couple of years our start times will change at the high school. It would move back 45-60 minutes. I also expect that the school bell schedule will change pretty significantly. It's probably not gonna be a lock-step 8 periods. It will be much more flexible, and provide students the opportunity to come late, be early, provide possibility for internships during the school day, and increase opportunities for early graduation. I would say to those seniors: remind yourself you've been well-prepared. Use the resources that have been offered to you over the course of 12 years and pursue your passions. This world is becoming a more fluid, individualized world. High school graduates can dictate their paths more so than any generation before. If you're able to use these resources and use the supports around you, you could really design and follow the path that you want to design and follow. Netflix vs Saudi Arabia: Free speech at what cost?

The recent drama that has unfolded on Netflix, a popular entertainment subscription group, was not revolving around one of their hit movies, Bird Box, but something to do with the company itself. Netflix recently pulled out an episode of "Patriot Act with Hasan Minhaj" from Saudi Arabia in which comedian Hasan Minhaj calls out crown prince Mohammed bin Salman from the perspective of a Muslim concerned about Saudi Arabia's impact on Islam relating to the murder of Washington Posts columnist Jamal Khashoggi. This episode is no longer available on Netflix in Saudi Arabia. Think of "the first amendment" and then flip it!

In Saudi Arabia, there is an autocratic government and the right to 'free speech' is not among the basic human rights. The country is home to modern cities and technological advances yet the nation's government is anything but modernized. Life is fine for the rich Saudi male, but the rest of the population that does not fall into this category have minimal human rights. Women seem to be impacted the most among the population such as not being able to discuss their opinion and having segregated areas in public. Saudi Arabian women are also required, according to Islamic law, to fully cover their bodies by wearing an abaya which is a long black cloak while in public. If these conditions seem appropriate or humane, then all hope in humanity is

Crown prince Mohammed bin Salman is, however, attempting to change Saudi Arabia into a more liberal country. Before he became crown prince in June of 2017, Saudi Arabia was under outrageous laws such as women not being permitted to drive. Women had to depend on chauffeurs and male relatives to travel anywhere by car. A year after he became crown prince, Mohammed bin Salman lifted the ban on female driving. This event sparked positive feedback among the women in Saudi Arabia and people were excited for more changes to come.

Fast forward to 2019, where the crown prince is

under heat for possible involvement in the killing of Jamal Khashoggi. Khashoggi often criticized the government of Saudi Arabia, particularly Mohammed Bin Salman. After Khashoggi's death, Netflix aired the episode, "Patriot Act with Hasan Minhaj". The Saudi Arabian government took offense to the episode which linked the murder to the crown prince and twisted Netflix's arm to pull the episode off the air. This operation created lots of controversies and made people in Saudi Arabia realize that they do not even have the basic right, "the freedom of speech"!

People in Saudi Arabia need to rise together, march forward, and fight for their right to free speech which is a fundamental human right. The United Nations (U.N.) and the rest of the world should support the people of Saudi Arabia as they protest against their monarch. There should be protests held around the country by the Saudi citizens declaring that they want and deserve more freedom. Next, the U.N should petition and work with Saudi Arabia to help people get their basic privileges. If the petition does not succeed, then the next step should be to force sanctions against Saudi Arabia. As oil is a major export for Saudi Arabia and the lifeline to their economy, the nations around the world should boycott the purchasing of oil from Saudi Arabia. This would have a severe impact on their economy and make Mohammed bin Salman question the approach he and his government have taken. In Hasan Minhaj's episode, he pointed out "MBS is not modernizing Saudi Arabia. The only thing he is modernizing is Saudi dictatorship". Mohammed bin Salman and the Saudi government should lead towards the path of complete liberalization instead of half-hearted gestures. WCASD Graduation Gowns

As graduation approaches for seniors, a big change has come to the graduation gowns in the district. Instead of distinct graduation gowns for boys and girls, there will now be three different gowns to choose from.

Dr. Scanlon, the superintendent of the school district, sent a letter on January 29th to explain the new change. This year, for the Class of 2019, there will be three gowns to choose from. In regards to East High School's colors, the choices are a red gown with yellow accents, a solid red gown, or a yellow gown. For Class of 2020, the school will work with juniors in order to create the best decision about the gowns. Before this final decision, however, the district said that they would only have one gown option for every graduate. Upset at the district's decision, one high school started a petition, claiming that they want to keep tradition and have two separate gowns. With over 1,000 signatures, the petition stirred up the gown controversy throughout the community. One person commented, "Tradition! Girls wear one of the schools colors and the boys wear the other. It has been this way for generations!" In a response to an email to Dr. Scanlon, he ex-

plained some of the other issues people had with the gowns. These issues included the fact that the summer pictures seniors took in their gowns won't match with the actual graduation day pictures, and that people just did not like the new color choices.

He continues in the email to explain the purpose of the changes: "It's not so much the color of the gown that is the problem but what the color represents. The color of the gown has represented whether the graduate is a boy, or a girl, yet we don't designate 'boy diplomas' from 'girl diplomas' Dr. Scanlon also explained that in the past, girls and boys were forced to choose gender-specific electives in middle school. Girls could only take Home Economics while boys could only take Shop class. Although this system has since long been removed, the district wanted to continue their progressive path towards the 21st century. Dr. Scanlon writes, "It's time

that our greatest celebration (Commencement) move into the 21st Century and represent the gender equality that exists with our programs."

In the end, whether it be tradition or progression, the graduation ceremony is a time where students get to celebrate their greatest achievements over the past 12 years. A student's graduation gown should not reflect their gender, but the choices that led to great accomplishments. With this decision, the school district is breaking barriers and ensuring that each student achieves their greatest potential, regardless of their gender.



What Is a Government Shutdown?

The most previous government shutdown was a national record, having gone on for 35 days. The previous record was 21 day shutdown during the Clinton administration. But what is a government shutdown? And what are the effects of one?

A government shutdown is when nonmandatory government organizations are closed because Congress is unable to pass appropriation bills (legislation that appropriates federal funds for specific federal departments, agencies and programs), or when the president refuses to sign those bills.

There have been many government shutdowns over the course of the United States' history. In 1980, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) was shut down after Congress was unable to pass appropriation bills for the FTC. The shutdown cost about \$700,000 and over 1,600 workers furloughed. From 1981-1986 during the Reagan Administration, there were three shutdowns that lasted from as little to half a day to a full day. Between 1995-1996 during Bill Clinton's presidency, there were two government shutdowns. The first one started on November 14th when Clinton vetoed a spending bill. This shutdown ended five days later on November 19th. The second shutdown started on December 16th and ended on the 6th of January. This second shutdown held the previous record for the longest government shutdown as it lasted 22 days. In 2013, during the Obama Administration, there was a government shutdown after the Republican led House of Representatives and the Democratic led Senate disagreed over political issues. This shutdown started on October 1st and ended just past midnight on October 17th. Recently, there have been two government shutdowns during President Trump's term. The first one lasted from the 20th to the 23rd of January in 2018 and the other which began on December 22nd of 2018 and has lasted into the new year.

As stated above, government shutdowns can occur for a wide range of reasons, but what happens during a government shutdown? The simple answer, the organizations and administrations



that do not receive money from the government close. These organizations include the Environmental Protection Agency, the Food and Drug Administration, Health and Human Services, National Parks, NASA, the National Institute of Health, the Smithsonian, and many more. Because these administrations are closed, an estimated 800,000 employees are not currently getting paid. Some organizations are recommending people barter for their rent and many are sharing their stories with the hashtag #ShutdownStories. The U.S. Coast Guard even recommended that people host garage sales, babysit, dog-walk, tutor, or work as mystery shoppers. They state, "Bankruptcy is a last option." Also, national parks are full of trash, many immigration cases have been postponed, The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has had to suspend most of its food inspectors, FBI staffers have been furloughed, meaning national security is at risk, some airport terminals in Houston and Miami have been closed and it has been reported that a passenger in Atlanta managed to get a firearm through TSA earlier this month. Finally, the U.S. Geological Survey is unable to update water and earthquake data, posing danger to some U.S. states.

Even though the most recent government shutdown is over, there is a risk of another one occurring. And we can all agree that it is better if it did not occur. And if it does, the sooner it is over, the better.

The State of the Union Address

President Trump delivered the annual State of the Union Address on the fifth of February. Here are the highlights.

Trump began the address with simple yet meaningful words, "Millions of our fellow citizens are watching us now, gathered in this great chamber, hoping that we will govern not as two parties but as one nation." He re enforces the fact that we are not two separate and divided parties, but one great nation with incredible potential. Trump also stated his hopes for America this year. He wants to make our communities safer, our culture and faith richer and deeper, and our middle class more successful.

After introducing a few important guests, Trump begins discussing the American economy. "We have created 5.3 million new jobs," he states. He also mentions the pace at which the economy is growing, "Wages are rising at the fastest pace in decades.." He ends the conversation on the economy with a summary on unemployment, "African American, Hispanic American, and Asian American unemployment have all reached their lowest levels ever recorded. Unemployment for Americans with disabilities has also reached an all-time low." Trump then begins to discuss the importance of bipartisan cooperation in the government. He states that if the two parties are to cooperate they must not be "war and investigation."

Trump shifted the conversation to the topic of his views on the southern border. "Now, Republicans and Democrats must join forces again to confront an urgent national crisis," he states, "Congress has 10 days left to pass a bill that will fund our government, protect our homeland, and secure our very dangerous southern border." He claims that the "lawless state" of the southern border is a threat to American welfare.

Many female lawmakers wore white to this Address in support and remembrance of the Suffrage Movement. Trump also mentions the significance of these women, stating, "No one has benefited more from our thriving economy than women, who have filled 58 percent of the newly created jobs last year...And exactly one century after Congress passed the constitutional amendment giving women the right to vote, we also have more women serving in Congress than at any time before."

Trump then begins to discuss trade and international relations. "To build on our incredible economic success, one priority is paramount: reversing decades of calamitous trade policies." He specifically talks about our relations with China, stating that he has much respect for the country, but their new tradedeal must protect American jobs, and reduce our trade deficit."

The next thing on Trump's agenda was the protection of American security. He discusses America's relations with many countries, including Russia, China, the Koreas, and Venezuela. He explains that the U.S. will be withdrawing from the INF treaty because of Russia's many violations of the treaty. He then explains his opinion on the situation in North Korea. "Our hostages have come home, nuclear testing has stopped, and there has not been a missile launch in more than 15 months." He then states, "If I had not been elected President of the United States, we would right now...be in a major war with North Korea."

His final topic relating to international relations was the Middle East. He discusses America's new approach in the region by saying, "Great nations do not fight endless wars." He then discusses how ISIS occupies a significantly smaller region then when he took office, and how it is time to reach a political settlement in Afghanistan. Trump then moves the topic to anti-semitism, and discusses the recent anti-semitic attacks on Jews in a Pittsburgh synagogue. "We must never ignore the vile poison of anti-Semitism, or those who spread its venomous creed. With one voice, we must confront this hatred anywhere and everywhere it occurs."

Trump then begins to end the address about an hour later by asking us think of those who came before us, and unite as Americans to continue being the great nation we are. "Here tonight, we have legislators from across this magnificent republic...Together, we represent the most extraordinary nation in all of history...We must keep America first in our hearts...And we must always keep faith in America's destiny that one nation, under God, must be the hope and the promise, and the light and the glory, among all the nations of the world..."

2019's Polar Vertex

The end of January and the beginning of February this year will be known for the dangerously cold weather that affected the Northeastern and Midwestern United States. As temperatures dipped below zero, areas became unsuitable for people to live in. There have been at least twenty-one people who have reportedly died because of the weather and many more resulting injuries. In Chicago, the temperature was as low as negative 45 degrees Fahrenheit, colder than Antarctica. Here in Pennsylvania, temperatures dropped to single digits and snow squalls ensued.

As this cold weather engulfed much of the country, many news sources used the term polar vortex to describe the situation. What is referred to as the polar vortex actually is spinning cold air above the North Pole. The bottom of the vortex, which is what edges south during winter, is called the polar front or polar jet stream. A strong jet stream keeps the polar air in the Arctic Circle, but if that jet stream is weakened, warm air will move north and cold air will move south. As the cold air migrates south, sub-freezing temperatures in America become common.

The polar vortex is not an uncommon weather pattern, but this year it seemed shockingly extreme. This year, the vortex split on January 2nd, causing the unfortunate weather about a month later. Some scientists have suggested that split of the polar vortex was caused by sudden stratospheric warming. There is some evidence that as the planet warms, the jet stream is becoming slower and wavier, or weaker.

The Oscars Controversy

This year's Oscars' nominations were announced on January 22nd. Although the list of nominees is filled with stars such as Lady Gaga, Emma Stone, and Christian Bale, many have criticisms for the choices made by the Academy.

Even before any nominations were announced this year, Kevin Hart stepped down from hosting the show in early December. The comedian's homophobic tweets from 2009 to 2011 resurfaced recently and prompted Hart to issue an official apology on social media. On Twitter, he also announced that he felt it was best to step down from being this year's host. As a result, the ninety-first Academy Awards will not have a formal host and will instead be hosted by numerous presenters. Another problem with this year's award show was the lack of women directors nominated for the directing category. Only one woman has won the award and a total of five have been nominated since the award show's start in 1929. With the #MeToo movement in motion and Greta Gerwig's nomination in 2018, there was hope that 2019 would be a better year for female directors. Unfortunately, no women have been nominated this year.

This year's "Best Picture" category includes Black Panther, BlacKkKlansman, Bohemian Rhapsody, The Favorite, Green Book, Roma, A Star is Born, and Vice. Although it is nice to see the diversity of movies entering this category, there have controversies surrounding two of the films. The first involves Bohemian Rhapsody, a biographical movie about Queen, a seventies British rock band. The movie's original director, Bryan Singer, has been accused of sexual assault and misconduct in multiple instances. He was fired and replaced by another director for a portion of the movie, although he is still credited as the director. In the case of Green Book, there have been two cases of disagreeable actions taken by those involved. During a panel discussion, Viggo Mortensen, who plays Tony Lip and is nominated for "Best Actor in a Leading Role", used a racial slur. He was quick to apologize and Mahershala Ali, his co-worker, did accept his apology but noted that it was not appropriate for Mortensen to say those words. In Mortensen's and Singer's cases, it leaves one to wonder if the Acad-

emy should evaluate movies based on just the movie itself or should they take into account the people behind it.

The story of Green Book has also been targeted for portraying its main character incorrectly. Green Book was a biopic about Dr. Don Shirley, an African American pianist that toured the segregated South of the sixties. The family of Dr. Shirley came out after the release of the movie to criticize the portrayal of the musician. Dr. Shirley's brother called the



movie a "symphony of lies" and the family has said that they weren't contacted in the making of the film. This unfortunate scenario is similar to Detainment, a live action short film also up for an Oscar this year. The family of the murdered two-year-old, whose death the film focuses on, was not contacted before the film was produced.

In brighter news, many other films and actors were nominated this year. Christian Bale, Bradley Cooper, Willem Dafoe, and Rami Malek are all nominated for "Best Actor in a Leading Role". Yalitza Aparicio, Glenn Close, Olivia Colman, Lady Gaga, and Melissa McCarthy have all been nominated for "Best Actress in a Leading Role". In the running for "Best Animated Feature Film" are popular movies such as Incredibles 2, Isle of the Dogs, Mirai, Ralph Breaks the Internet and Spider-man: Into the Spider-verse. The event is set to take place on February 28th, at 8 p.m.
